# ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

Again, good morning, everyone. At this time

I'm calling today's meeting of the Texas Racing Commission
to order. The time is 10:30 a.m.

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And I want to welcome all of you to our June 2023 meeting. I'd like you to stand, please, and join us in the pledge of allegiance.

(U.S. and Texas pledges were recited.)

CHAIRMAN PATE: Thank you. Please be seated.

I want to welcome all of you to the June meeting of the Texas Racing Commission, beginning today with agenda III.A. As usual, there are a number of items that deserve mention this morning which I would like to bring to the attention of all commissioners.

Today's meeting will largely focus on the events of the last legislative session and the results of the hard work and long hours of General Cook and Phil working with industry to advance our legislative goals.

But first I want to also welcome our general counsel, Virginia Fields. She's actually back in the office, but not with us here today. Some of y'all may not be aware, she's been dealing with a lung cancer diagnosis for the last six months. And by all reports, her successful treatment at M.D. Anderson had been achieved.

And as she regains her strength, the rules review will get back on track on September 5, 2023 here in

Austin at this very location. And we will continue with the rules review at that time.

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Next, I want to also offer congratulations to Commissioner Mach on his appointment as the chairman of the Department of Public Safety, who, as a result, will continue to serve as an ex-officio commissioner of the Texas Racing Commission.

Additionally, congratulations are also due to Commissioners Martin, Moore, McNabb, Contreras and Waight on their reappointments. We have a strong set of commissioners who are well familiar with most of the matters of importance to the Commission. The Texas Racing Commission, in my view, is very well positioned for the future.

On balance, we do have a great legislative success to report. Of course, all our legislative initiatives were not enacted. What was enacted into law represents the most material and sweeping change to this agency since its creation.

As General Cook and Phil will detail in later reports, we have become a general revenue supported agency beginning with the next biennium. And we were successful in obtaining some supplemental funding for the balance of 2023 to offset those unusual and exceptional expenses which we incurred last year, principally in the IT areas

of the budget and the migration of the agency's data to the State system.

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Although a legislative solution was proposed pertaining to matters involving Greyhound racing and bush tracks, among other matters, such were not enacted and we will continue to handle those matters as best we can under existing law.

I do want to particularly thank not only

General Cook and Phil for their significant long hours of
legislative engagement, but also Commissioner McNabb, who

made valuable staff introductions to key House Budget

Committee members and made several trips to personally

engage with key legislators. Additionally, industry

representatives helped this agency at every level of
legislative engagement as staff sought to explain the

proposed strategic plan and budget. So again, thanks to
each and every one of you.

Our continuing subject, HISA, has not gone away but will not be the subject of much discussion today. What we will be discussing is opening the race date application period for the 2024 racing season. It's important for the Texas horseracing industry to understand that we are still in litigation over the constitutionality of the HISA statute. And in fact, the case is headed back to the Fifth Circuit for a hearing scheduled in October

2023.

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As I have stated before, we have an absolute statutory conflict with the Federal statute which, even if deemed constitutional, cannot be implemented in Texas under current law.

I want to remind y'all here, too, that something that's not talked about, HISA was in total control of all racing safety when the 12 animals were tragically lost in the well publicized events at Churchill Downs. HISA delayed, by its own decision, the implementation of its medication rules from May 1 to May 22, after the Preakness, a decision, I think, that should be investigated. It's hard to understand that an agency that fought so hard to implement these medication rules then sought to delay them at the time of the Kentucky Derby and Preakness.

Following the legislative session, I can confirm that there is absolutely no interest in conforming Texas law to afford HISA the opportunity to commandeer Texas Racing Commission staff to perform Federal regulatory duties. In fact, concerns were raised about the wisdom of adding another layer of regulation when the state agency that we have today is working with industry to strengthen our regulatory framework. Further, absolutely no appropriations were provided by the Texas

Legislature to pay HISA fees or to perform tasks assigned to Texas by the Federal Government through the HISA legislation, nor do we expect that support in any kind of form in the future.

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What we are focused on in the coming months is an initiative to sign reciprocity agreements with our neighboring states on licensing standards and other key aspects of regulation, beginning with the State of Oklahoma.

I also want to just mention, yesterday in the Thoroughbred Daily News there was an article published by a fellow by the name of Richard Schmidt -- who apparently was a former chairman of this Commission -- who was urging the Texas Racing Commission leadership to adopt and go along with the HISA regulations. I don't know who's informing him, but he does not understand the legal basis upon which we've made our decisions and are compelled to continue to deny thoroughbred racing export signal.

I would invite him or anybody else out there that has questions of y'all to please call General Cook or myself or Commissioner McNabb. We'd be happy to explain this. All that information is on the website; all that information has been repeatedly explained to anyone who has shown an interest. So I'd ask you to look into it if that happens to be your situation.

We will now move through the rest of today's agenda. Next, agenda item III.B recognizes vice-chair of the Commission, Dr. Connie McNabb, for her remarks.

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Commissioner McNabb, you have the floor.

COMMISSIONER McNABB: Thank you, Chairman.

I do appreciate everyone who did help us. One of the key remarks that we got as we talked with legislators and their staff, they said the industry is so happy, you know, that we are working together. We're trying to address -- certainly we have issues, but I want to thank everyone who was engaged talking.

Indeed we are here to interface with you. We have a regulatory job. But I hope that you realize that we are here to listen to what you have to say to try to find the right answers to the questions.

And that was very much something that we heard back from the legislators, that this was not just a fortress and not an adversarial relationship, that we have got a good and strong and hopefully building relationship with the industry.

But thank you, thank you, thank you for letting them know that we're trying just as hard as we can. We're not going to compromise on the job that we have to do, but we're fair. We're working with you, and we have open lines of communication, and thank you for your help.

The other thing I would like to call out and commend, and this is not to the detriment of the other breeds, but I would like to commend what TQHA is doing. I had the opportunity to go to one of the horse shows.

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So the HIEA funds, indeed, they go to a lot of racing purses and that generates a lot of interest and it certainly helps the economy in Texas, but some of those funds also go to horse shows. I went to one and folks who don't understand racing and don't understand the horse business think that every horse as soon as they hit four years old somehow winds up on a truck to become dog food, which is very far from truth.

But especially when you have a viable, vibrant industry and a show horse industry, the little bit of HIEA money -- the people who go to the horse shows and a lot of the classes there, I saw many, many horses in their mid teens and early twenties who are living the best life that horses could live. I would like to be one of those horses.

They have classes, the ranch riding classes and so forth, kids on these horses, ladies on these horses, ladies my age on these horses. But just the HIEA money that goes towards belt buckles and the recognition and awards, that generates so much interest. It generates a tremendous amount of economy, so hay, trucks, fuel,

clothes, you name it.

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But I do want to commend that this is also a place, and classes that are made so horses who have been wonderful horses -- and many horses within the Quarter Horse industry have been race horses and then they become show horses. So this really reinforces that Texas cares about horses for their lifetime. And horses that are race horses are not done with wonderful lives just because they get done with racing, that there's a lot of great use and wonderful homes and loving families on this.

And if you don't believe it, come to one of these horse shows. You will want to be one of those horses too. They live a great life.

So thank you, TQHA.

CHAIRMAN PATE: Thank you, Commissioner McNabb.

I recall specifically at our first Senate

Finance Committee hearing, it was either Senator Zaffirini

or Senator Hinojosa said it's so nice to have y'all come

before us and there's no drama in the Texas Racing

Commission. That was a good report.

The next item on the agenda III.C opens the floor to any commissioner who wishes to make remarks. Are there any commissioners who wish today to make remarks prior to the remainder of the agenda?

COMMISSIONER CONTRERAS: Chairman, I'd like to

just commend General Cook and her staff for the incredible 1 job. I know it was your first year and everything was 3 thrown at you and the accomplishment of being able to go 4 before the legislature and accomplish much is big. 5 been in your seat and I understand the difficulty of that 6 process, and thank you for your leadership. 7 CHAIRMAN PATE: Thank you, Commissioner 8 Contreras. 9 Anyone else? 10 (No response.) CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Next on our agenda, 11 item IV. Public comment. 12 13 Phil, has anybody signed up for public comment? 14 MR. FOUNTAIN: Yes, sir. Tracy Sheffield. 15 CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Ms. Sheffield, 16 you'll be recognized for three minutes. 17 MS. SHEFFIELD: Good morning. As always, it's 18 a privilege to address the Racing Commission, and I 19 appreciate the opportunity. 20 It is my sincere hope that the two issues that 21 I bring before the Commission today have already been 22 addressed. If so, thank you; if not, I hope they will 2.3 find a place on your priority list. I strive to limit my 24 comments to the Commission only when the actions or

inactions by the Commission affect the economic welfare of

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the Texas Thoroughbred Association membership.

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The first issue I'd like to address is how the breakdown of the machines of the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory -- TVMDL, to make it short from here on -- that is used to test the samples was handled by the Commission. The timeline of events that started in March when the machine broke down, it took a week for the lab to get a technician out and diagnose the problem and figure out what parts needed to be ordered. The lab was told that the part was on back order and would not be available until April 18.

That time frame was well over a month. People have bills to pay and bills that come due every month.

Purse money cannot be released until the tests are cleared.

Owners had no access to purse money they'd earned to pay their trainers and other bills. Trainers had to wait for their money. This meets my definition of economic hardship, and that's why I'm here today.

As soon as the Commission learned that it would be longer than a month for there to be a possibility for purse money to be released, that's when action should have been taken. We all know what it's like to pay bills and they come due every month. No money was saved by the Commission on sending samples to a secondary lab.

The only harm that was done was to horsemen who ended up having to wait almost two months for their purse money to be released. Furthermore, horsemen were not given a timeline from the Commission as to when they might expect that purse money to be released, and that's not acceptable.

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In future, should such an event occur -- and it's likely that it will, things break down, parts aren't available -- it is my hope that the Commission will handle things in such a way that purse money can be paid out within a month of earning it. Two weeks would be better.

As everyone here knows, the Commission members are appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the governor of the State of Texas. My question to the appointed commissioners is: Have you informed the governor of the economic impact to racing caused by the current deadlock between state law and HISA, Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act? If not, why not?

He should be made aware the people that he honored with the appointment to the Commission as to the state of the industry they regulate and what needs to be done for it to flourish. While HISA is rife with problems and additional bureaucracy is most unwelcome, addressing the economic impact caused by the inability of tracks for legal reasons to export our signal should be a primary

priority of the Commission and waiting another year is 1 2 scaring us. 3 How long will the tracks continue with the low handle that they're earning right now? It's frightening 4 5 Have the Commission members informed the governor 6 of the damage that's being done to this industry that 7 generates millions of dollars and provides jobs and other economic opportunities for all types of citizens? 8 9 Everything possible that can be done to ensure 10 the economic success of racing should be done. I'd like to see the commissioners take an even more active role in 11 12 supporting the industry they regulate. I think we could 1.3 see more progress in negotiating the legal quagmire that 14 is currently damaging our industry. 15 Thank you. 16 CHAIRMAN PATE: Thank you. 17 Any other comments? 18 MR. FOUNTAIN: No, sir. 19 CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. We now move to 20 agenda item V.A and the executive director's report. 21 General Cook, please give us your report. 22 MS. COOK: Good morning, commissioners, ladies 2.3 and gentlemen. 24 I want to first extend my thanks for Virginia 25 Fields and Phil Fountain for staffing the February 2023

Racing Commission meeting here in this building. I was at the legislature that day. And I haven't had an opportunity to appear before you since December, so I'm going to take a couple of minutes just to talk about what's happened at the Commission since then.

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I appreciate the fact that you were willing to adjust the Commission meeting schedule so that -- we moved basically the April meeting to September. So we will have meetings in October, December as scheduled, and August and September, which will give us an opportunity to really provide you some great staff products.

Over the past six months, of course, the agency has continued to experience a time of dramatic change. Fortunately, at my request, former deputy director of DPS, Duke Bodisch, returned to the staff to assist me with rebuilding the Enforcement program. I'm grateful for his mentorship. We want to be a great enforcement agency in our own lane, as the charge was given to me when I first took this job. And he also was instrumental during the legislative session at really mentoring and helping us understand kind of how to really address and talk to legislators.

With Duke's assistance, I've recruited Aaron Grigsby, our new deputy executive director for Operations in March of 2023. And we also accepted Dwayne Price's

request for retirement -- he was our former chief information officer -- after 27 years.

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I'd like to take a moment to celebrate his service with the Racing Commission. So, Dwayne, if you'd join me up here.

So, ladies and gentlemen, my first day of work,
Dwayne Price came into my office to set up my computer,
and I didn't know him and he wasn't the chief information
officer, and I thought here's a fellow who's really
talented, why isn't he in charge of IT. So I drafted him
to go up to the leadership role and become in charge of IT
in the middle of trying to move to a new building, deal
with fragile servers. Dwayne rose and met that challenge
even though he was concerned about taking that risk, but
he leapt out and took that risk with me, and I'll always
be grateful for his service to the Commission and to the
State of Texas.

(Applause.)

MS. COOK: So we have for you, signed by the governor, congratulations on your retirement and service to the State of Texas. We have a flag flown over the Capitol in your honor, and a certificate of the date.

(Pause for presentation and photos.)

MS. COOK: Thank you, Dwayne, so much for your leadership.

MR. PRICE: Thank you. It was a pleasure.

MS. COOK: Congratulations.

MR. PRICE: Thank you very much.

(Applause.)

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MS. COOK: As you all know, when I started my position, I instituted an employee of the month and employee of the year program, and we celebrated the first employee of the year last year with Virginia Fields winning employee of the year. We have continued that program and I look forward to celebrating another employee of the year, however, I felt I needed to add something else, a Director's Award for Excellence.

Our motto "Excellence Starts Here" is not a strive for perfection, it is a challenge issued to bring your best efforts to work and lead your team in that way every day. Today I'd like to present the first award of the Director's Award for Excellence to a gentleman who has met this challenge and is a model for excellence in everything he does. He is an incredibly dedicated public servant with wisdom beyond his years and without whom the agency would not have been so well received at the Texas Legislature.

He is quiet and unassuming but a powerhouse in effective communication and relationship building, and I think you would all agree exemplifies excellence and has

met the challenge during his service to the agency, but 1 2 especially during legislative session. 3 Phil, please join me up here to receive the first award. 4 5 (Applause.) 6 MS. COOK: It actually was Phil's idea we 7 should have this award and I thought what a great 8 opportunity to give him the first one. 9 MR. FOUNTAIN: Wonderful. I'm honored. 10 MS. COOK: Thank you for everything you've done for us. 11 12 (Applause.) 13 MS. COOK: So he gets a nice statue, the 14 adoration of his peers, and 40 hours off to take leave 15 with his wife, which he absolutely deserves. 16 Congratulations, Phil. Now on to the business of the Commission. 17 During legislative session -- Phil will give you sort of 18 19 the readout of that -- but I want to just tell you when I 20 had my job interview with Judge Pate and Commissioner McNabb, they discussed with me the importance of building a 21 22 functional agency regardless of mission. And so of course, 2.3 over the past 18 months I've been told by numerous folks, 24 you know, that I didn't know anything about horseracing.

And I said, Absolutely true, when I came to work here I did

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not know, although I've learned so much from the community that's been willing to teach me.

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What I did know about was good government, financial management, and relationship building, and what has been helpful is that we approached the legislature with the message that was very clear that we wanted to answer the criticisms of Sunset and we wanted to become a regulatory body that all Texans could be proud of, and our key messages were four:

First, that the agency has inherently governmental statutory compliance activities required of all state agencies regardless of mission, which we believed should have been funded through a transparent, general revenue process. At least, in part, that call was answered from the legislature, and we're grateful for that. So we received general revenue for our drug testing program.

Second, we have the responsibility to monitor, regulate and enforce licensed activities and address unlicensed activities throughout the state, which should continue to be funded by a GR dedicated account, licensing revenue funds, and we have continued to receive that and received a bit more for those mission sets.

Third, the legislative appropriations request that I presented to the budget committees was not a

request for the agency, rather it was a resourcing model that was required for the agency to become the regulatory body that Texans need in the horseracing industry, and that call was answered.

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Fourth, I was able, I think, to get them to effectively understand that the horseracing industry is at a crossroad, and in my judgment, the future is bright if we all work together to realize the potential for future growth. But I really believe that Texas could be the premier state for horseracing. There are more horses in Texas than any other state in the nation, and with effective market competition and the right regulatory body, the economic potential is amazing, and I think we will realize that given the legislative investment that we recognized.

For the remainder of this fiscal year, turning back to day-to-day operations, we're going to be focused on closing out the financial and recordkeeping activities for the biennium. What I have decided to do is hire a financial examiner to go back through this biennium and the biennium before us and go through all of the fiscal challenges that we had and kind of write me a summary report of all that to close that out. Because, as you know, we have been privileged to change our budget structure completely so our budget structure actually

follows our four strategic goals: enable, protect, communicate, and partner.

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So our budget strategies now model after our strategic plan, and we're departing from twelve budget lines and going down to six. So we're going to be able to streamline and be more transparent about how we spend money.

But we have a real need, as we go through our licensed racetrack reviews and as we go through our fiscal records, to actually make sure everything is in order and we can get a comprehensive report of how we did, and make sure that as we put new procedures in place that we never have some of the challenges that we had in the past. So we're going to prepare that report and it will be publicly provided to the Commission and posted publicly for everyone to read.

Senate Bill 30, fortunately, provided the agency supplemental spending authority for this biennium. So as you all probably know, we had a cash over revenue problem for years. In other words, this year we were projected to have cash revenue of \$5.1 million, our appropriations limit was \$3.4 million, so what was happening biennium after biennium is the excess cash that we had was being swept by the Comptroller and the licensees were paying the same fees again and that money

was not being used to regulate them.

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With the support of the Commission, with the support of the regulated industry, and with the effective communication that we had, we wanted to be able to spend the money that we already had on hand. We were given additional funds to spend this year to fully execute the 39 FTEs that we have and also to address some of our interim IT needs, so we're really grateful for that.

We're focused on making sure we fully execute that money since we asked for it.

Short term, though, in the next couple of weeks we're going to be supporting live racing operations. Sam Houston Race Park just concluded their Quarter Horse meet successfully, Lone Star Park still runs through July 4, Retama Park starts in San Antonio, and Gillespie County Fair Association starts July 4 weekend. So we'll actually be out in the field spending time with all of them to make sure that goes well.

We're also going to do a lot of recruiting because we're going to head up to 57 FTEs. And so we're already starting to look for veterinarians, investigators, stewards, and a couple more financial management folks to make sure that we do our job well.

We're going to continue to develop solutions to address the agency loss of our Enforcement database. We

did not get funding for a new database, but we have some interim solutions that we're working.

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And then we are meeting with the great State of Oklahoma on Friday at Lone Star Park and start getting a reciprocity agreement in place for licensing, ruling, and perhaps drug testing protocols between the two states.

It's a great way to get started on things we can do and not worry about things we can't do.

Over the next 180 days, obviously we have the breed split allocations that are going to be renegotiated by the industry, how we distribute HIEA and ATB funds, our active and inactive license reviews. We have eight licenses under review, so I'll be reporting out two of the licenses per meetings in the next four meetings.

And I think what's most important for you to understand is the Greyhound industry will need our assistance. There was some legislative attempts made to sort of deal with what's the state of the Greyhound industry during session. The statute has not changed, however, in our budget we receive no money to regulate Greyhound racing. I put \$750,000 in as a contingency rider should they go back to live racing.

The Budget Committee in the House asked is there going to be live Greyhound racing in the future, and we had to say that the industry actually stood up and said

they do not have the ability to conduct live races. So we did not receive money to regulate it. We will support them and we will still assist with winding down, but there's some tough decisions to be made for the Greyhounds and so we'll facilitate that to the best of our ability.

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And since they have publicly declared in a Commission meeting that they don't have the capability to run -- and this is on the Greyhound breeding side of things -- we expect no race date requests for Greyhound tracks this year, like past year.

On page 3 of your meeting materials is the letter that I signed approving the Texas Horsemen's Partnership as the recognized horsemen's organization. It's an important item for you to appreciate how much the leadership of the executive director of the Texas Horsemen's Partnership, Ms. Marsha Rountree -- who is here with us today -- is to the way that we do our jobs in the regulated industry. I hope that Marsha would tell you that if she picks up the phone and calls me, I'll always listen to what the challenges are and she speaks for all of the horsemen in Texas with respect to some of the major decisions about how we go about our business.

And it's really critical and really grateful that she's continuing in that role that we continue this great level of communication between the industry that we

regulate, because we're all going to face challenges in the coming years. And the Texas Horsemen's Partnership is a key organization to help us work through those challenges together.

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One of the things that we're also going to work on is developing an interim legislative engagement strategy. I mean, we really do not want to walk back in the Capitol in a year and a half and say, Hi, I'm Amy Cook, there is a Racing Commission in Texas, it is important that we have it, and here is why. And so there was sort of an uphill climb there to get people to understand that there is an agency, that that agency will do a great job, and that that agency will overcome the challenges of the past.

So one of the things that happened at the very last part of the legislative session -- and Phil will talk about Senate Bill 1620 -- is we were trying to get some critical statutory changes that were holding the agency back into a bill. I spoke with Brian Francis, who is the interim director at Sunset, and he and I agreed that we would go through a limited scope Sunset review during the next session because that will allow us to continue to educate on the unique challenges we have.

No other agency had a provision in their statute that if they received general revenue they would

have to pay it back with interest -- I mean, nobody had that problem, and we don't have that problem anymore because now that's out of our statute. Nobody else in Article 8 of the General Appropriations Act was completely self-funded and self-regulated. Everybody had general revenue but us. Not anymore, right?

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So things like that that were so huge to moving us forward, I would walk into a room and go, we have these unique problems. And everybody would say, nobody has those problems. Well, Brian Francis was in charge of TDLR which the agency was supposed to be put under. Brian Francis understood those challenges, and there's still more that we need to work on to make sure that we become fully functional.

So I'm really excited to work with the Sunset staff and educate them on how this agency, that should be on par with every other great agency in Texas, really deserves that they understand and they know what changes we need and why we're asking for them. So I'm really grateful to go through the limited scope review. I would have agreed to a full review as long as I get a chance to talk about how great the agency can be with the legislature investing in us. So really looking forward to that.

And just to kind of close out here on the

agency budget structure changes, as I said, they follow our goals and our strategic plan. Overall, in this biennium we received \$3.7 million in 2022; a little bit of extra money was given to us for our move to the George Bush Building.

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This particular year our total appropriations limit was \$3.4-, as I mentioned, our cash, though, was \$5.1-. We received additional spending authority of \$767,000, so we'll be able to at least fully execute our FTEs and execute some of that money before the rest is swept by the Comptroller.

In 2024 we'll receive \$6.4 million and in 2025 \$6.7 million. About 20 percent of that will be general revenue, which is a start, right? I mean, get started and start somewhere, really starting to show the legislative investment in a great enforcement agency. Really grateful for that.

But really most importantly, you probably all know this, but we were the only agency -- here's another we were the only -- that paid for former employees retirement costs, budgeted at a million a year our of our unappropriated cash revenue. So for years and years and years, I guess there was -- you know, we talked to one of the authors of the Racing Act and sort of the idea was if you want to have a Racing Commission, great, you pay for

it yourself, right. So you don't need general revenue, you don't need any of this to happen.

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So we had 55 former employees and the bill was \$504,000 a year coming out of the cash being pulled out, at about \$34,000 a month out of the cash revenue. That's gone and we have a contingency rider now that that's paid for by general revenue.

So that burden has been lifted off the industry, as well as a portion of the drug testing bill lifted off the industry. And the legislative investment in the success of a regulatory agency that they created with an enabling statute will start to be shown. And I can't wait to go back and talk about the great things we've been able to do with that investment.

And so that concludes my remarks, commissioners. If you have any questions, we look forward to --

CHAIRMAN PATE: I have a question. You might have mentioned it, but in connection with the limited Sunset review, we also gain an additional two years of life before there's actually a sunset.

MS. COOK: That is correct.

CHAIRMAN PATE: So that was a good quid pro.

And agreeing to a limited Sunset review allowed us to be tacked on our language which we had in another bill that

didn't get a second reading. We were able to tack on that language, and that's some of the artful work of Phil and our friends to make that happen.

MS. COOK: Absolutely.

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COMMISSIONER McNABB: And with all of the superhuman efforts and the incredible accomplishments — this might burst a bubble — Amy really is human. Her limits exceed most of ours, but so all of you know, we also don't forget the promises that we made. We are going to be reconvening the Rules Review Committee very shortly.

As the legislative session went on, and that combined with the very unfortunate illness of our general counsel -- who is now come out the other side and rung the bell and we're very proud of her -- trying to do the rules review when we were fighting for our lives in the legislative session and without Virginia. So we said we don't want to go out and have these meetings unless we can really make some forward motion. So we have not forgotten, we are going to be starting those back up and full blast and we'll continue as we go through all that rules.

Amy's plate was beyond full and her accomplishments really are superhuman but she finally said I actually have a limit. So we had to put those off. And it's not that we're neglecting it, but if we're going to

engage with you all, we want to make sure that we come to the table ready to sit down and really do our work, and we just couldn't and do the things that we had to do to survive.

So thank you, Amy and Phil and the whole team, but we'll be back seeing you and we'll work through the rules.

CHAIRMAN PATE: Commissioner Miller.

COMMISSIONER MILLER: Yes. I've got a point of clarification on the budget.

MS. COOK: Yes, sir.

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COMMISSIONER MILLER: You're talking about unexpended balance moving forward. Was that just for the fiscal year or was it from biennium to biennium?

MS. COOK: So biennium to biennium we were only allowed to carry over \$750,000 cash; that's been changed to \$2 million. That is a biennial limit. It's kind of funny -- not funny ha-ha, just funny -- when we went through this particular year, '22 to '23, mid biennium, the Comptroller read it that we could carry over all the cash that we had, which that question apparently had never been asked.

So every year the agency, I think for about ten to fifteen years, had just carried over the \$750-, not on the biennium but every fiscal year. All the rest of the

1	money was swept by the Comptroller.
2	COMMISSIONER MILLER: Right.
3	MS. COOK: Thousands and thousands of dollars
4	that really the industry had paid that really wasn't being
5	carried over to use. So now we've upped that to \$2
6	million. But in the interim of the biennium we can carry
7	over as much as we have.
8	COMMISSIONER MILLER: So everything from the
9	12th month to the 13th month.
10	MS. COOK: Yes, sir.
11	COMMISSIONER MILLER: And \$2 million on the
12	24th to the first month.
13	MS. COOK: That is correct, yes, sir.
14	COMMISSIONER MILLER: And you may have
15	mentioned and I didn't catch it, what about transfer
16	authority between strategies?
17	MS. COOK: We only have 10 percent transfer
18	authority between strategies, but I think that what
19	COMMISSIONER MILLER: Is that enough to make
20	the books balance at the end of the biennium?
21	MS. COOK: Yes, it is.
22	COMMISSIONER MILLER: Okay. Thank you.
23	MS. COOK: Yes, sir. Thank you.
24	CHAIRMAN PATE: Any other questions or
25	comments, commissioners?

COMMISSIONER CONTRERAS: I do have a question.

And, Amy, you may have covered this earlier, forgive me

if I missed it.

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But one of the challenges when you first came onboard was the inequity of the staff pay compared to other agencies, because just the Racing Commission was kind of out here on its own. I'm assuming that will be addressed the next legislative session.

MS. COOK: Absolutely. So the supplemental spending that I received, I asked for the salary shortfalls and I asked for fully executing the 39 FTEs.

Because we have 31 people today -- we can't afford to hire more than 31 on the current budget that we have.

And then all state agencies received additional spending authority, in our case, not appropriations for staff salary increases so all state agencies got that.

So we'll be able to bring our veterinarians commensurate with fellow veterinarians, and so forth. Those are my biggest concern is the specialty veterinarians and stewards and the investigators, bringing them up to par with other agencies so we can recruit great folks. Yes, ma'am.

CHAIRMAN PATE: Any other comments?

(No response.)

CHAIRMAN PATE: Again, ladies and gentlemen,

ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342 you just need to understand it was a full-time effort by

Amy and her staff during the legislative session. There

were lots of phone calls between myself, her, Phil,

Commissioner McNabb and others.

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And again, I want to thank you for your efforts on behalf of the agency.

MS. COOK: It's my honor to serve. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN PATE: The next item on the agenda is

V.B, the legislative update. Phil Fountain will provide

the report to the Commission.

Phil, please give your report.

MR. FOUNTAIN: Good morning, commissioners.

For the record, I'm Phil Fountain, Racing Commission chief of staff.

As you heard, the past several months have eventful and productive for the agency to finally start to address past Sunset concerns and those of the legislature. General Cook and I spent countless hours monitoring and tracking legislation, gathering inputs from our senior staff. We've drafted and submitted fiscal notes to our friends in the Comptroller and the LBB.

I'd like to recognize the great work of our CFO, Dinorah Chiu, and her financial team, Ernesto Palacios, Michelle Turner. Together they helped us have the correct information to provide timely and accurate

information in response to those fiscal notes.

Additionally, Jo Ward, with the contracts team, she supports them.

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Vanessa has done great work for us, as well as Leonard, to ensure we have quality communication products that we could share with them, whether to PowerPoints or other collateral type things that we were able to give to the staff in a quick manner.

Additionally, we provided resource materials as appropriate to legislative staff working on agency matters, educated many on the role and responsibilities of the Commission. It was very helpful to have Judge Pate and Dr. McNabb's presence at the Capitol at critical junctures, like when Amy testified before Senate Finance and other legislative meetings.

On page 4 of your meeting materials you'll find a high-level fact sheet of major legislative action from the 88th Regular Session. Additionally, you've been provided excerpts of related provisions of House Bill 1, Senate Bill 30, House Bill 1620, and House Bill 4635.

You'll note the pending governor action under H.B.1 and H.B. 1620. These bills were signed over the weekend and will become law.

In addition to the Senate reconfirming every member of the Racing Commission for another term, these

bills exemplify historic trust from the legislature in the agency. Specifically, the legislation begins to posture the Racing Commission as the law enforcement agency it was intended to be, and it starts to separate our inherently governmental activities in funding from those related to business and commerce.

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Starting in October, the legislature has provided general revenue funding for our drug testing strategy. Additionally, they addressed the anomaly of the licensees paying for former employees ERS benefits, as Amy mentioned. This will now be funded through general revenue, like all other agencies.

House Bill 1620 begins the modernization of the Texas Racing Act you called for last year in the strategic plan and LAR which you approved with industry input, and it directly addresses Sunset Commission criticisms.

For example, it repeals the requirement of the agency, which is ultimately the licensees currently, to repay general revenue with interest. This allows for the method of finance shift that was approved through the appropriations process. It increased the agency's carryover authority between biennia from \$750,000 to \$2 million to help stabilize operations. That \$750,000 number was written many decades ago and that brings us in with the CPI adjustment to carry forward.

Further, we're now able to apply for and accept grants to find additional funding opportunities. This will open up the door for federal and state law enforcement grants, as well as in other areas that might benefit the agency to address its core mission.

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Lastly, the agency's licensing practices are now conformed with state law and our agency Sunset date has been moved out to 2029, as Judge Pate mentioned.

However, this limited Sunset review over the next 18 months will give us an opportunity to get that critical third-party feedback and continue the opportunity to proactively address those concerns as we develop the next strategic plan and LAR before the next session in 2025.

The Racing Act was also incorporated into the new Texas Racketeering Act. This could become a powerful tool for the agency to address detrimental activities occurring at brush and bush tracks across the state.

This was sort of a bill that we became aware of because that was amended late in session. We weren't fully tracking it so we're going to look into to see how this really does impact the agency. But we think it will be a great tool to truly show this agency has that jurisdiction throughout the whole State of Texas to address these detrimental activities. So we'll give you more briefing on that in the months ahead.

And of course, the agency didn't get everything we asked for, but no agency does, as Commissioner Miller, I'm sure, knows. Two items of note that we didn't get funded were, one, our exceptional item to modernize the enforcement database. This will continue to be a challenge but we're already driving towards interim solutions that Amy mentioned and we'll describe those more in months ahead.

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Secondly, as was discussed, the contingency appropriation for Greyhound regulation was rejected. We discovered the legislative aversion to Greyhound racing that is currently developing, and there's a push by some to outlaw this activity as we saw a committee substitute approved with such language. Without regulatory appropriation, this will require further discussion of the sport's future and how that impacts the regulated business interests.

Additionally, the Texas-bred Incentive Program stayed within our bill pattern which is not detrimental to the agency but it continues to perpetuate a misunderstanding of agency appropriations and the amount of money the agency receives.

And the Equine Education and Research Council funding, what I call a glitch, did not get fixed. This means about \$50,000 a year will continue to be swept by

the Comptroller. Really it's more of a missed opportunity than a detriment, and it's something we'll continue to educate Sunset on and hopefully address in future sessions.

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Lastly, the agency sought the authority for 96 FTEs with 26 funded by GR, but received 57.3 non-funded by GR. However, the legislature has been very generous and appropriations made provided the historic statutory language, which is a historic shift towards normalizing this agency alongside other state agencies. After this session, we'll now be positioned to continue the discussion in the interim and prepare for the next legislative session.

Pending your questions, that concludes my remarks.

CHAIRMAN PATE: I'd just like to comment, the relationships and introductions that Phil was able to establish and make throughout session were just incredible. I think we talked to every significant legislator that was involved in any committee dealing with us in personal conversations concerning the Racing Commission, the business and what we specifically were asking. And it was through Phil's assistance and the assistance of others, industry representatives who made these introductions and set up meetings, it was just a

phenomenal team activity really.

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And I just want to congratulate you for that part of the leadership which you provided in making that happen, Phil, and I appreciate it very much.

Are there any questions?

MR. FOUNTAIN: Well, I appreciate that, sir, and it was definitely a team effort. I was along for the ride, happy to provide resources to the staff. Industry was very helpful, and we provided the resources to understand what they're trying to do with the legislation as well. So it was definitely a unique partnership that doesn't always occur during a legislative session.

CHAIRMAN PATE: Well, and as you know, there were two or three times we thought we were just free-falling, so here we are.

All right. Well, thank you, Phil.

Next is agenda item VI.A. General Business,
Discussion and possible action to open an application for
a Class 2 horse track in Jefferson County, in accordance
with 16 Texas Administrative Code, Section 309.3(b).

General Cook, would you please address this item?

MS. COOK: Ladies and gentlemen, on February
13, 2023, I received a request from Mr. David Whitley
requesting that an application period for a Class 2 horse

track be opened in Jefferson County for a 60-day period.

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The authority for this request is found in Section 309.3 in the Texas Rules of Racing and the following requirements must be met for the Commission to approve the application period. A 60-day period is established and our staff recommendation is that the 60-day period would be August 1, 2023, through September 30, 2023. The period must be published in the Texas Register at least 30 days before the opening date of the application period.

So should you approve the request today, we would publish it in the *Texas Register* no later than tomorrow. When deciding whether to open an application period, the Commission shall consider the availability of racing and wagering opportunities in the proposed geographical region, the availability of competitive race animals for the class of racetrack, and the workload and budget status of the Commission.

My recommendation is that the Commission approve a 60-day period from August 1, 2023, to September 30, 2023, and if approved by the Commission, I will send a letter back to Mr. Whitley outlining the requirements for a completed application to be provided to the agency and expect to present a report on the status of the application at the October Commission meeting.

1	Mr. Whitley, I'm not sure I saw him. I know
2	Mr. Kevin Johnson is here today as a resource witness if
3	you have any questions.
4	CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Thank you, Amy.
5	Phil, has anybody signed up for public comment?

16	COMMISSIONER MILLER: Second.
17	CHAIRMAN PATE: Second by Commissioner Miller.
18	Is there any discussion?
19	COMMISSIONER McNABB: This is a different
20	entity, so this track is not coming in under the
21	management of any of our other tracks. Correct?
22	MS. COOK: That's correct, a different entity.
23	CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Thank you.
24	No further discussion. All those in favor
25	indicate by saying aye.

(A chorus of ayes.) 1 2 CHAIRMAN PATE: Any opposed? 3 (No response.) CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. The motion carries. 4 5 The next agenda item is VI.B. General Business, 6 Discussion and possible action to designate July 1 through 7 September 30, 2023, as the application period for proposed race dates during calendar years 2024 through 2028, 8 9 including charity race dates and training facility official work dates, under 16 Texas Administrative Code 10 Section 303.41, 303.42, and 313.504. 11 12 General Cook, please address this agenda item. 13 MS. COOK: Commissioners, as set out in the 14 Texas Rules of Racing, the Commission approves the dates 15 for the application period for the 2024 to 2028 live 16 racing season. Before we get to the requests, I want to share some information. As of June 16, 2023, the Texas Racing Commission distributed in the current fiscal year approximately \$23.8 million in HIEA and ATB payments. Our duty is to make sure funds are paid according to the established agreements.

I'll note the profound quote from the TQHA website: "I cannot imagine what racing in Texas would have looked like in 2020 without the programs that were created as a result of the passage of H.B. 2463. I am grateful to the governor, the lieutenant governor and all the legislators that supported the bill that has given a

boost to the entire horse industry in Texas." Ben Hudson, 1 2 Track Magazine owner, former TQHA president. 3 Now to the requests. Commissioners, on pages 5 4 through 23 you'll find two applications. 5 applications are for events from the Texas Quarter Horse 6 Association. The dates of both events are between 7 September to December 2023 during the Lone Star Park meet. The first event is for the 2023 Ouarter Horse 8 9 Meet at Lone Star Park for Accredited Texas-bred owners, breeders and stallion owners awards. The Texas Quarter 10 Horse Association is requesting \$815,000. The second 11 12 event is the Lone Star Park Stakes Program. The requested 1.3 amount is \$250,000. 14 Both event funds are needed by September 2023. 15 There is TQHA staff here if you have any further 16 questions. 17 The staff recommends approval for both events, and if you have any questions for me, I'll be glad to 18 19 answer them. 20 CHAIRMAN PATE: My only question is we'll have 21 the money on hand based upon the timing of the request, 22 correct? 2.3 MS. CHIU: Yes, Commissioner. 24 CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. 25 Any other questions, commissioners?

Pursuant to Section 2028.204(b) of the Texas Occupations Code, the Texas Racing Commission (TXRC) invites breed registries recognized in Section 2030.002(a) to apply for funding from the Horse Industry Escrow Account (Account) for events that further the horse industry.

#### **GRANTEE RESPONSIBILITIES AND ACCOUNTABILITY**

Grantees (breed registries receiving funding) will be responsible for the conduct of the project(s) identified in the proposal(s) for which funding was granted. Each grantee shall monitor the day-to-day conduct of the project to assure adherence to statutes, regulations, and funding terms and conditions. The grantee must carry out the activities described in the approved scope of work.

The grantee will be accountable for documenting the use of funds from the Horse Industry Escrow Account (HIEA) and must ensure that funds are used solely for authorized purposes. The grantee must ensure:

- Funds are used only for activities covered by the approved project.
- Funds are not used in violation of the restrictions and prohibitions of applicable rules and statutes.
- All reports are completed in a timely manner.

Each grantee must ensure it has an adequate accounting system in place and sufficient internal controls to ensure expenditures are reported and records maintained for five (5) years after the conclusion of the project, or longer if required by TXRC.

#### FUNDING PARAMETERS

Awards are subject to the availability of funds. If anticipated funds are reduced or become unavailable before the full amount approved is disbursed, the amount to be paid to grantees may be reduced or eliminated.

#### APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

#### Form Requirements:

To be considered, applications must be complete and include all the requested information:

- 1. **Form HIEA-1, General Information.** Include ONE copy of this form regardless of the number of proposals submitted.
  - a. Breed registry information. This is the organization that will be the recipient of funds and will be held accountable for reporting and project performance.
  - b. *Program contacts*. These are the individuals who can answer questions about the project's activities and performance.
  - c. Certifications and signature of authorized official. This is the person legally able to bind the organization in contracts or agreements and may be the same person as the program contact.
- 2. **Form HIEA-2, Project Narrative.** This section provides a comprehensive framework and description of all aspects of the proposed project(s). *Use one form HIEA-2 per event for which funding is requested.* Each proposal may not exceed six (6) pages (not including supporting documents). Proposals must address the following information:
  - a. Project Title (Event Name)
  - b. Event Date(s) or Approximate Date(s)
  - c. Total Amount Requested for the Event

- d. Timeline of Need for Funds
- e. Project Summary
- f. Project Description
- g. Anticipated Project Results/Economic Impact on the Horse Industry
- h. Project Oversight
- i. Project Budget

#### BUDGET INFORMATION

1. Advanced Funding Payments: This program may advance an amount in working capital for the grantee to ensure the necessary resources to carry out the project. These funds will require reporting to substantiate the advanced funds have been expended in compliance with eligibility requirements. Ineligible expenses must be personally reimbursed within 30 days of notice of ineligibility from TXRC. Expenditures shall include sufficient documentation detailing each expense to decision regarding eligibility.

The application must state when funds are needed for a particular event. If some funds are needed by a certain date for one part of the event but the rest are not needed until later, the application must state what portion of the funds are needed by what date.

**2. Eligible Expenses.** Generally, expenses that are necessary and reasonable for proper and efficient performance and administration of a project are eligible. Account funds may not be used to supplant normal business costs but instead must be used to cover the costs incurred for the approved proposed activities. To be eligible for payment with funds from the Account, an expense must be reasonable and adequately documented in accordance with 16 TAC Section 303.322(d).

Examples of eligible expenditures include:

- a. Event production costs.
- b. Event award supplements, Texas-bred supplements, and prizes for approved events
- c. Advertising expenses
- d. Operating expenses, including the salaries of breed registry staff, interest and other financial costs related to borrowing and the cost of financing, contributions to a contingency reserve or any similar provision for unforeseen events, and audits or other accounting services; and
- **3. Ineligible Expenses.** Expenses may be prohibited by state or federal law or determined to be ineligible by program guidelines. Examples of ineligible expenses include, but are not limited to the following:
  - a. capital improvements.
  - b. donations or contributions made to any individual or organization without express approval from the Commission for such contribution or donation.
  - c. costs of entertainment, amusements, social activities, and incidental costs relating thereto, including tickets to shows or sports events, meals, alcoholic beverages, lodging, rentals, transportation, tips, and gratuities.
  - d. fines, penalties, or other costs resulting from violations of or failure to comply with federal, state, or local laws and regulations.
  - e. liability insurance coverage not specific to a particular event or series of events for which the Commission has allocated funds from the account.
  - f. expenses related to litigation.
  - g. professional association fees or dues for the breed registry or an individual.

h. legislative expenses such as salaries and other expenses associated with lobbying the state or federal legislature or similar local governmental bodies, whether incurred for purposes of legislation or executive direction; or

i. fundraising.

#### **EVALUATION AND SELECTION INFORMATION**

After all proposals have been received, TXRC program staff will conduct an administrative review to determine whether an application complies with all requirements of Tex. Occ. Code Section 2028.204(b) and 16 TAC Chapter 303, Subchapter G, and to evaluate the relevance and effectiveness of the proposed project based on the following factors:

- Anticipated impact on the state's horse racing industry
- Anticipated impact on live racing at the state's racetracks
- Anticipated impact on the horse breeding industry
- Anticipated impact on the state of Texas
- Anticipated impact on non-racing horse industry activities

Assessments of anticipated economic impact for an existing event must be based on only the effect of the additional funding provided from the Account. For example, if funds are requested from the Account for race award supplements for an existing horseracing event, the evaluation of the economic impact must be based only on the effect of the increased race awards, not on the economic impact of the entire race.

#### REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Grantees will be required to submit periodic performance reports. Reporting timelines will be incorporated into the funding agreement. As part of TXRC's ongoing monitoring of the use of funds from the Account, grantees must demonstrate progress toward achieving project goals. Failure to comply with reporting requirements may result in the withholding of further payments and/or termination of the award.

Grantees shall submit to the Commission a report every quarter detailing the accomplishments of the project objectives for the previous calendar quarter. Quarterly reports shall be submitted to the Commission no later than November 30, February 28, May 31, and August 31 of each year. Each report must include:

- 1. the amount of funds expended toward each event for which funds have been allocated.
- 2. for each completed event, the total amount of funds expended toward the event from the Account, a breakdown of the funds expended for that event, and copies of documentation of all amounts expended; and
- 3. the following certification: "By my signature below, I certify that (1) all of the information in this report is correct, (2) all funds expended from the horse industry escrow account were used in accordance with Section 2028.204 of the Texas Racing Act and the Rules of the Texas Racing Commission, and (3) the breed registry has all documentation required by 16 TAC § 303.324."

The funds received and/or expended by the breed registry from the Account must be included in the breed registry's annual audit of financial statements required to be submitted by June 15 of each year. An auditor's statement must be included as part of the annual audit attesting to the proper use of the funds received by the breed registry from the Account.

#### SUBMISSION OF APPLICATIONS

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

Selected applicants will be notified of the Commission's approval of their proposal(s) and will receive an official funding agreement from TXRC. Payment will not issue until the funding agreement is fully executed.

TXRC reserves the right to fund projects partially or fully. TXRC reserves the right to negotiate individual elements of any application and to reject all applications. Where more than one application is acceptable for funding, TXRC may request cooperation between grantees or revisions/adjustments to an application to avoid duplication and to realize the maximum benefit.

#### **Proprietary Information/Public Information**

The applicant is responsible for clearly designating any portion of the application that contains proprietary or trade secret information and must state the reason(s) the information is designated as such.
