## ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

Again, good morning, everyone. At this time I'd like to call today's meeting of the Texas Racing Commission to order. The time is, by our clock, 10:30.

Commissioners, I would like to welcome all of y'all to the September 2023 special meeting of the Commission.

All please stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

(The U.S. Pledge of Allegiance was recited.)

CHAIRMAN PATE: Followed by the Texas Pledge.

(The Texas Pledge was recited.)

CHAIRMAN PATE: Please all be seated.

I do want to welcome all of y'all to the special September meeting of the Texas Racing Commission.

Just as a reminder, we canceled our regular meeting in April during the session because Amy and staff were so busy working with the legislature. And so this is one of the meetings that will comprise the six we're required under our statute to have every year.

We are going to continue with our review today of the licensed racetracks, as well as take the opportunity to focus on the launch of the agency-led special safety campaign entitled "Safety Starts Here."

Our goal in launching this campaign is to create a culture in which safety is a shared responsibility in the Texas horse racing industry. The agency staff, led by the

executive director, spends less time behind a desk and more time standing with those in the industry to understand their perspective and carry out the task that I gave them last year, which was to create an effective safety inspection program.

As we learned this summer, the impact of decisions, both by racetrack associations and horsemen to address safety compliance early and often, can mitigate the risks that we sometimes see arise not only in our state but in others.

You don't have to look too far up there at Saratoga Raceway and the number of horses that have had fatal incidents here just in the last month. Is that correct? Yes. And we're talking about, of course, not only equine safety but jockey safety, human safety.

As we begin our rules review process again this October with public meetings, our focus is on the new safety and health chapter and the critical items we should address for both human and equine safety. We look forward to a great turnout as we aim to get the right safety mindset and models in place to meet our goal of becoming the premier state for horse racing in the nation.

The next item on the agenda, item III.B, recognizes the vice-chair of the Commission, Dr. Connie McNabb, for her remarks.

COMMISSIONER McNABB: Thank you, sir.

I just want to follow on for what the chairman had to say. Safety on the backside of the racetrack, we are in an inherently dangerous business but it's the business that we're in. Also, those who are on the outside of racing looking in think that it's just some big thing and horses are running around an oval.

They don't recognize what a family -- sometimes we're a dysfunctional family, but a family -- you cannot be on the backside of a racetrack and not have connection. You can make all the rules in the world but unless people care about one another, are looking out for one another -- our role as regulators, we want to lay the groundwork so if there are things that we need to do to facilitate making things even safer, we want to do that.

We want to support that racetrack community so we are all participating in the sport as safely as we can, looking out for one another. Because this is a dangerous business for the humans and for the horses, but it is also one of the most exciting businesses.

And this is our heritage in Texas. Horses are our heritage, so let's keep this up. Let's do it right.

I really think that we've got a great program that is going -- so far this year we have done very well.

Let's continue with that.

Thank you for your interest. And we will be 1 2 doing the Rules Committee, especially for health and 3 safety, coming up next month, and I look forward to your 4 input. 5 CHAIRMAN PATE: Thank you. 6 The next agenda item, III.C, opens the floor to 7 any commissioner who would like to make remarks. Are 8 there any commissioners today who wish to make remarks 9 prior to the remainder of the agenda? 10 (No response.) CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Hearing none, we'll 11 go forward. Thank you, commissioners, for all of your 12 13 continuing support of the agency. 14 Now we'll move on to agenda item IV, public 15 comment. Virginia, has anyone signed up for public 16 comment? 17 MS. FIELDS: No, sir. CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Moving on, the next 18 19 item of the agenda, item V.A, the executive director's 20 report. 21 Director Cook, please give us your report. 22 MS. COOK: Good morning, commissioners, ladies 23 and gentlemen. I'd like to welcome everyone to this 24 special Commission meeting.

I'd like to start by celebrating the three new

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employees that joined the team last Friday. I'd like to introduce them and have them stand for you to meet them.

First, I'd like to introduce Jerry Kovar.

Jerry joins us from the Travis County Sheriff's Office,
retired from there. And he will be our Special Services
chief running the Enforcement program. Welcome, Jerry.

Hilario, known as Lalo Torres. Lalo joins us after a distinguished career in state and public safety positions with the Houston Police Department and other departments.

And last but not least, Ruben Morin. Ruben joins us after retiring from the Department of Public Safety and some other local law enforcement positions.

We welcome you to the agency and we're really honored to have you as part of the team.

(Applause.)

MS. COOK: I want you to know that all three of these gentlemen made it through a very deliberate hiring process. And they will be an important part of our efforts to increase our focus on not just safety, but also integrity, as we protect the community who engage in licensed horse racing activities.

I would again like to thank Duke Bodisch for his leadership and counsel on law enforcement matters, as well as his efforts in assisting us in recruiting an

incredibly talented team of law enforcement professionals.

Following his example, and the great advice I received from Commissioner Mach only a month after I started this position, the December Commission meeting of December 2021, yesterday I completed all the requirements to receive a Texas Commissioned Peace Officer License.

(Applause.)

MS. COOK: I took that step because after a career of military police service in the United States

Army for 35 years, there was a fairly simple process to do paperwork and take an exam that allowed me to have that license and make sure that I run the program well. As I prepare to take the oath to protect our great state, I promise to use my license and training to continue to transform the agency into the great law enforcement agency that we need to be in our own specialized lane.

But today the focus is on safety. It's a great day for the State of Texas, the Racing Commission, and the horse racing industry in Texas. We are launching our safety campaign today with a new website, and I ask you to look at the monitors so you can see it.

We invite everyone and challenge everyone to be part of what we're calling the Safety Winners Circle.

Anyone can be a safety champion because it all begins with you. You can become one or nominate one for taking

actions to keep the Texas horse racing industry, both human and equine athletes, safe.

Our focus is to catch someone doing something right. We can be the premier state for horse racing, but what we want to be known for is our focus on safety and integrity. With safety as our watchword, we will gain focus on how to mitigate risk for a timeless Texas tradition: Horse racing. Small steps taken daily make all the difference in achieving the goal of becoming the safest state in the nation for horse racing, one act at a time.

I would like to particularly thank someone who we are not recognizing today but I would like him to stand up, and that gentleman is Bryan Pettigrew.

Bryan, would you stand up?
(Applause.)

MS. COOK: As you all know, so dearly, particularly the Quarter Horse community, Bryan joined the Penn Entertainment team for Texas tracks, Sam Houston and Retama, only a few months ago. And with his leadership, we got through the Retama Quarter Horse meet with a number of challenges and we got through that working together. And I'm happy to report with the meet concluding last Saturday, we had relatively few incidents because we worked so well together. We appreciate all of the shared

responsibility for that meet and that concluding with safety.

Now I'd like to welcome those who joined us to celebrate the licensees who we'd like to recognize for their contributions in keeping everyone safe in the industry, despite personal risks to themselves or a race they were entered in with the goal of winning.

To start off our recognition of very special folks, I'd like to invite our commissioners to come down to the front of the table to be a part of the presentations and take pictures with the licensees. Would you please join us down here?

As they make their way down, I'd like to invite Representative Tracy King and we're honored to have him here today to make a special presentation to Chaplain Michael Bingham.

MR. KING: We're here today because I'm so proud of the Texas Racing Commission and their efforts at community involvement. And I've been involved with racing in Texas for a lot of years, and I've carried some legislation several years ago that we're all very much aware of here in this room and throughout the state of Texas and the industry.

And so I represent Uvalde and I live in Uvalde, Texas. And as we all know, on May 24, 2022, we had a

terrible, terrible tragedy there. And people came from all over the state to help in that time of need.

We had first responders, we had families and counselors come in. But there were a few who did more than the chaplain for the Texas Retama Track, Mike Bingham. He spent months there counseling people, not only the families, but ironically, the first responders were the ones that needed immense amounts of counseling.

You probably never -- and I hope you never get to see the videos of the aftermath of that shooting. But when you saw the men and women walk out of that room, you could tell that they were changed forever in their life after seeing that.

And so, Chaplain, you provided a lot of great counseling to those people and a lot of tears were shed, and we'll be lucky if we get through this without some more. In recognition of your service to the citizens of Uvalde and the first responders and the families and the State of Texas, I want to present you with this flag that flew over the State of Texas, and with your permission, I'll read it.

"This certifies that the Texas flag herewith presented to Chaplain Michael Bingham by Representative Tracy O. King, was flown at the Capitol of the Sovereign

State of Texas in recognition of his selfless efforts to 1 2 provide support, encouragement and grief counseling to the Uvalde families and community following the Robb 3 4 Elementary School shooting on May 24, 2022. 5 "In witness thereof and pursuant to the 6 authority vested in me, I hereunto set my hand and the seal of office at Austin, Texas." 7 8 So let me present this to you, if you will. 9 (Pause for presentation and photos; applause.) 10 MR. GRIGSBY: Thank you, commissioners. For the record, my name is Aaron Grimsby, the deputy executive 11 director. 12 We will be presenting a few more awards today 13 14 in recognition of some noteworthy events the Racing 15 Commission has documented throughout 2023. We will be 16 calling the people up individually to receive the awards 17 and allowing family and co-workers to come up alongside them to the front of the room for additional photos. 18 19 The Commission would like to first recognize 20 Austin Perhamus to come forward and receive the Safety Excellence Award. 21 22 (Applause.) 23 MR. GRIGSBY: As he's walking up, I'll read the 24 citation.

"Security Officer Austin Perhamus for

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exceptionally meritorious actions while serving as a security officer for the Gillespie County Fair

Association. Officer Austin Perhamus is recognized by the Texas Racing Commission for safety excellence."

On Saturday, July 15, 2023, Officer Perhamus observed a serious injury occur when a Quarter Horse drove a jockey into the inside rail during a race and broke several bones in the jockey's leg, simultaneously throwing the jockey from the horse. Officer Perhamus ran onto the track to assist the jockey and administer first aid until the ambulance could arrive, eventually assisting loading him into the ambulance for higher care, injuring himself in the process.

The Texas Racing Commission would like to recognize Austin Perhamus for immediately attending to the injured jockey who later required a rescue flight to Austin hospitals for emergency surgery. His actions directly increased the safety posture of live racing being conducted a Gillespie County Fair in Fredericksburg and throughout the State of Texas.

We'd now like to call the family up as well.

(Pause for presentation and photos; applause.)

MR. GRIGSBY: Mark, you might as well stay up
there, sir, you're next.

The next award would be for Mark Pinter,

"Security Officer Mark Pinter for exceptionally meritorious action while serving as a security officer for the Gillespie County Fair Association. Officer Mark Pinter is recognized by the Texas Racing Commission for safety excellence."

On the same day, Saturday, July 15, 2023,
Officer Pinter voluntarily assumed a critical role while
guarding the backside restricted area. Earlier during
live racing a jockey was seriously injured, requiring an
emergency flight to Austin and corresponding surgeries.
This presented a problem for the family of owners and
trainers who had horses and stalls to care for but wanted
desperately to follow their injured family member to
Austin during emergency treatment. Officer Pinter
volunteered to care for the horses overnight as an extra
duty, allowing the family members to caravan to Austin and
support the injured jockey.

Taking on additional duties in support of horsemen participating in the horse racing industry in Texas demonstrates the incredible unique culture Texas horse racing has when supporting each other to increase overall safety, often being the norm, not the exception. His actions directly increased the safety posture of live

racing being conducted at Gillespie County Fair and throughout the State of Texas.

MR. GRIGSBY: The final Safety Excellence award today involves a jockey who unfortunately could not be here today. He's currently racing in Oklahoma. There will be a video presentation with award acceptance at the end by Jockey Guild Manager John Beech. If everybody could please focus their attention on the screens for the

SPEAKER ON VIDEO: At Thoroughbred Race Number 7 at Lone Star Park on April 14, 2023, Jockey Floyd Wethey, Jr. noticed that his horse, Eyes on Red, was restless in the gate immediately before the start. He stepped off the horse until it steadied, but his left foot became entangled and looped in a lead rope left inside the gate. As the horses left the gate, Floyd noticed the problem and glanced down briefly to assess the danger, immediately recognizing the hazardous impact to the field if the entangled lead rope brought his horse down or entangled others.

Floyd skillfully maneuvered Eyes on Red to the front of the field and towards the inside rail near the first turn before reaching down and grabbing the rope to free it. He successfully untangled the lead rope near the

half mile pole and threw it over the inside rail away from the swiftly moving field. His quick thinking and excellent horsemanship avoided a potentially large accident by preventing Eyes on Red or other horses from being entangled in the misplaced lead rope.

Floyd is receiving the Excellence in Safety

Award from Director Amy Cook, along with a custom Jockey

Excellence belt buckle engraved with his name. His

skillful actions directly led to the safe completion of a

Thoroughbred race without impacting the outcome and

prevented injuries to both horses and jockeys.

MR. WETHEY: (Via video) I would like to thank the Texas Racing Commission for the Jockey Excellence

Award. It's been a pleasure riding in Texas the last few years. I've got to work with some great people.

Even though the situation I found myself in was dangerous for me and the people around me, there are others that do more than I even did, and these unsung heroes are the outriders and assisted starters. What some people don't understand is when things get rough and most are trying to get out of harm's way, they are the ones that put their own well-being aside to make sure that everyone else is safe and they do this every day. I would like to dedicate this award to them.

And thank you all. God bless.

1 (Applause.) 2 MR. GRIGSBY: Mr. John Beech, if you would come 3 to the front. Regional Manager for the Jockey Guild John 4 Beech will be accepting the award on behalf of Floyd 5 Wethev. 6 (Pause for presentation and photos; applause.) 7 MR. GRIGSBY: This concludes the awards 8 presentation. I'll move the podium back and turn it back 9 over to Director Cook. 10 MS. COOK: One more round of applause, please. 11 (Applause.) 12 MS. COOK: Push your mic on, Amy. Thank you so 13 much, Leonard. 14 By the way, all of the wonderful multi-media 15 that you see is a credit to Leonard Buchanan. 16 (Applause.) 17 MS. COOK: I might have the spark of the idea and Leonard makes it come to life. So thank you, Leonard, 18 19 for the great video. It's really awesome that Aaron was 20 able to reach out to Floyd Wethey and have him do a video 21 shot. 22 Our page is live today. The video will go live 23 today, and we'll continue to look for more Safety 24 Champions in the great community in Texas.

So now we turn back to the chair for the next

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agenda item.

CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. The next item is item VI.A., General Business for discussion, consideration and possible action on the chair's designation of an ad hoc committee on the future of the Greyhound industry in Texas.

Director Cook, please address this item.

MS. COOK: So before I make the recommendation to the Commission, I really want to take a moment just to say that there really are no absolutes in life or in business. And the time that we're now in in the history of both Greyhound and Horse racing is really transformative for this community, and the best way the staff can prepare a recommendation is through thoughtful discussions and factual reviews of where we stand today.

The near abolishment of the agency nearly created the end of the industry, our great lab almost closed, and every participant was dramatically affected by the period of uncertainty that began with the pandemic and in some ways continues today. I consider it one of my key responsibilities to continue to provide regulatory certainty to the industry while continuing to create sustainable business processes for the agency.

What you have in front of you as part of your meeting materials is a recommended draft of an ad hoc

committee on the future of the Greyhound industry in Texas. I make this recommendation because there's a lot of energy, there's a lot of concerns, there's a lot of discussion points that need to happen around the future of Greyhounds in Texas.

So with that, I'll turn it over to the chair of the Commission with any further questions or comments he may have.

CHAIRMAN PATE: Well, I'd just like to remind everybody of a few things. Number one, there hasn't been any Greyhound racing in Texas for the last couple of years. Number two, as we discussed at length at the meeting last month, the legislature appropriated no funds, no funds for this agency to regulate Greyhound racing in the next biennium. So there's simply no money available to do that, to provide stewards and all the kinds of things you'd have to do if we had pari-mutuel wagering on Greyhounds.

And so we're at a real crossroads, I think.

One other thing is there was a committee substitute bill,
the House Bill 4115, which did not get a second reading.

But that bill actually had language in it that
specifically abolished Greyhound racing in Texas.

And so we have heard -- we, the Commission, particularly at the Rules Committee meeting that I

attended with you in, I think it was Fredericksburg -- I can't remember -- but in any event from the Greyhound industry racers themselves that there is no Greyhound racing, that it's dying pretty much in every state. So that's kind of where we are.

We're going to be talking about it further, but we have some licenses that we're going to have to deal with and a statute that we have to deal with.

Does any other commissioner have anything to add at this point in time?

The idea here is we have some divergent interests. As y'all may recall, how much do we have in suspense right now, \$2-1/2-, \$3 million?

MS. COOK: The Texas Greyhound Association would have to provide you that information, but my understanding is they have about \$3 million that they're holding.

CHAIRMAN PATE: About \$3 million. If you recall more or less a year ago, that money was earmarked -- it actually came as a small slice of money that came from horse racing and it was for the purpose of enhancing purses in the Greyhound racing, and there's specific statutory language to that effect. We had the Greyhound folk approach us with some kind of an agreed deal to get us to distribute the money to the existing

Greyhound interests.

The Commission did not think that was appropriate, but as a matter of thoroughness, we requested an attorney general's opinion, which we received. The attorney general indicated we could not make that distribution; it was not consistent with the statute.

So we have about \$3 million that is going to have to be dealt with if there is no Greyhound racing because of the vagaries of the statute. We are also going to have to deal with the fact that there is no Greyhound racing and what that means with respect to these licenses that are out there and where we go from here.

We have not had a definitive word from the legislature that says Greyhound racing is abolished. That was not passed, as I just mentioned a few minutes ago. So technically, we still have our statute which provides the protocols for Greyhound racing, but we have no Greyhound racing business going on and we have no funds as an agency to regulate Greyhound racing.

That's where we are. Am I missing something?

I mean, that's where we are.

So the idea that Amy and I discussed and Amy advanced was let's see if we can't have an industry representative, a recognized industry representative for the Greyhound Association for the Greyhounds, and the

Texas Horsemen's Partnership for the horsemen. And so we thought that it would be appropriate to have some type of an ad hoc committee. They'll announce the date of their meetings and anybody else that wants to monitor them.

I discussed with Commissioner Moore whether he would be willing to undertake chairmanship of the ad hoc committee; he said he would. I think that's particularly useful because Mike is a lawyer and he'll be able to look at the statutes and kind of give us some perspective.

And hopefully what will come out of that, if nothing else, is an understanding of everything that needs to be changed within our statute if there is going to be no Greyhound racing, and then what problems come out of that in terms of how to resolve them or at least what the divergent viewpoints are. It will ultimately be up to the legislature to make that decision, I'm guessing, and that's kind of where we are right now.

So that was the idea, and you can see on your materials that we've had discussions with Nick James, who is here today on behalf of the Texas Greyhound

Association. We've also discussed with Tommy Azopardi, as well as Sabrina Brown. Both are Greyhound track representatives; they have clients that are Greyhound tracks. And then, of course, Marsha Rountree for the Texas Horsemen's Partnership.

And my understanding is they've all agreed to serve. And again, the idea is to let people get together and talk about this thoughtfully between themselves and come back to us with, if nothing else, an identification of the problems and some sense of where the varying interests think it ought to be resolved.

That's where we are.

MS. COOK: And I think what I've gotten here is a report out back to the Commission, the date being February 2024. So in our current strategy of just setting all the racetrack licenses, including all the horse and Greyhound that are scheduled this year for discussion, the Commission wouldn't be making any decisions on the Greyhound licenses until no earlier than February of 2024. So this would give opportunity for the staff to do some work with some of the folks, put out a schedule of public meetings, have those public dialogues.

But I think it's important for me to say this

now -- I was going to hold it for the racetrack license

reviews -- but there's a difference at the agency between

appropriated budget authority, which Judge Pate mentioned,

and then cash revenue that the agency gets. The Rules of

Racing provide payments that are required for active horse

tracks and active Greyhound tracks.

An active Greyhound license, which all three

Greyhound licenses are currently considered, is \$156,471 per year, and to the agency that is \$469,413 per year in terms of cash revenue that runs the agency. After having done the math calculations and really looked at the fact that we did not get any budget authority for Greyhound regulation, I don't think it's appropriate for the active Greyhound licensed owners to pay that fee to the agency in fiscal year 2024.

I say that because I think that takes the pressure off of some of the discussions. They have made deposits for the active racetrack reviews, which is \$5,000 which the staff can charge for time and so forth. But I think the charging of the fees, it's probably time to back off on that because it is a real turning point in their history and we are not actually regulating any kind of Greyhound industry activity as the staff.

So I put that out there because I think that should just give a positive sign in terms of the way that I'm thinking about the industry and all the things they have to grapple with. And really, I think this is what has challenged this agency in the past. Any action we take, whether enforcement action or whether action on licenses, shouldn't be tied to whether or not the agency will have to close if we take such action.

So it's a great sign that we got 20 percent

general revenue. I think the model that we'll go after in the next biennium is 80 percent general revenue, 20 percent licensing fees, because really we need a stable source of income to be able to do good government and make good decisions.

So we are not -- and I will send formal letters to Valley Race Park that was reviewed last time and the two Greyhound tracks -- we are not going to gather that fee from them this year. But we will continue to work with them and invite a lot of public participation on the ad hoc committee and all of those recommendations that we'll make to the Commission.

CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. So commissioners, do any of y'all have any questions?

COMMISSIONER CONTRERAS: I do have one clarifying.

So, Amy, I think I recall this from maybe a year and a half ago. What was it that killed the industry, was it COVID or was it before that? Because it's my understanding the tracks have not been in racing condition in terms of safety, so what was it?

MS. COOK: We do have some folks from the TGA here that may want to speak to this. But I will tell you that I met with all the Greyhound licensed racetrack representatives, as well as the TGA Board members, in

April of 2022 and I was trying to figure out what was going on with them. My job is to provide hope, not to make a decision about the future of the industry.

But some of the discussions that we had there, as well as at the Rules Committee meeting that we launched last August and some of the other public meetings, was that the breeding of the dogs had stopped or slowed down. And the circuit in the United States which they used to run -- so horses and Greyhounds run on circuits -- Florida was a big part of that. Florida decided to stop Greyhound racing, other states have gone away from it, so now really only have one state left, and that's West Virginia, that does Greyhound racing.

And the pandemic, I think, complicated that.

There was sort of a sea change going on across the United States as well. So then the tracks did close, just like the horse tracks, and they weren't able to come back. Some of that was probably the state the agency was in, quite frankly, that it was almost being abolished and there was a lot of uncertainty.

We've had a lot of very specific discussions with Paul Watt, who is the president of the TGA, who is here today, as well as Nick James, who is their typical representative in public meetings, about what do we do to make sure that we provide some sort of a great avenue for

1	them to then conclude the business of Greyhound regulation		
2	in the state. But it's still in the statute, so it's		
3	important that we follow our own statute and yet support		
4	them and their inputs.		
5	CHAIRMAN PATE: Well, I think they're just		
6	overall market conditions too. I'm no expert on it, but I		
7	mean, the influences of the PETA people and then just		
8	general popularity of dog racing, it just seemed to have		
9	waned.		
10	COMMISSIONER MACH: Mr. Chairman, I move that		
11	we approve the designation of an ad hoc committee to study		
12	the future of Greyhound racing in Texas, as outlined in		
13	the materials today.		
14	CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. There's been a		
15	motion made by Commissioner Mach. Is there a second?		
16	COMMISSIONER MARTIN: Second.		
17	CHAIRMAN PATE: Second by Commissioner Martin.		
18	Is there any further discussion?		
19	(No response.)		
20	CHAIRMAN PATE: Hearing none, all those in		
21	favor signify by saying aye.		
22	(A chorus of ayes.)		
23	CHAIRMAN PATE: Any opposed?		
24	(No response.)		
25	CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. The motion carries.		

We're on to the next agenda item VII.A.1 and 2, 1 2 Racetrack Proceedings, Discussion on the ownership and 3 management of the active Greyhound racetrack licenses scheduled for review under 16 Texas Administrative Code, 4 5 Section 309.53. 6 Director Cook, please address the first item, 7 item 1, Gulf Greyhound Race Park. 8 MS. COOK: Thank you, Judge Pate. 9 Gulf Greyhound Park is a licensed racetrack in 10 La Marque, Texas. Their last active operating review was in 2020. They've hosted live races from when they were 11 licensed until 2017, then their last racing was in 12 February of 2020, as that activity began to wind down. 13 14 Currently the racetrack does not have land; the land was 15 sold. 16 And we have Mr. Tommy Azopardi here as a resource witness should the commissioners have any 17 questions on this review. 18 19 CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Mr. Azopardi, do 20 you have any comments? 21 MR. AZOPARDI: Mr. Chairman, thank you for the 22 opportunity to be a resource for you. 23 Virginia, I'll hand you my card in a moment. 24 We appreciate the opportunity to undergo this 25

review. Both of the clients that I represent, Gulf

Greyhound, that you're considering now, and Gulf Coast Racing, have prided themselves on being active participants in the community. As Dr. McNabb said earlier, it is a family.

Both of my clients have made a commitment to this industry, the pari-mutuel industry in Texas, for many decades. We find ourselves in a situation where we have licenses with no money appropriated to regulate the live racing activity, and we have a shortage of Greyhounds. But we remain committed to try to find a path forward and do the best we can for the industry.

So thank you.

CHAIRMAN PATE: All right.

MR. AZOPARDI: And if I may, Mr. Chairman, I want to congratulate y'all and thank the Commission for recognizing Chaplain Bingham. He goes way beyond.

As Dr. McNabb said, it's a community. And the chaplains do the Lord's work not only within the confines of the racetrack but beyond, as represented by Chaplain Bingham. So I want to especially thank him for his service to the industry.

CHAIRMAN PATE: Thank you for your comments.

COMMISSIONER McNABB: The land that has been Gulf Greyhound has been sold. Has the structure been taken down? That is never going to see a racetrack?

MR. AZOPARDI: That will never see a racetrack at that site again, that is correct.

COMMISSIONER McNABB: Okay. Thank you.

MR. AZOPARDI: I will comment on that because there's been a lot of questions, and I will say that during the pandemic the owners of that license were very frustrated because at that time, under a previous administration, they kept receiving supplemental invoices on top of the regular fees for regulation activity when there was absolutely nothing to regulate. We were shut down. We were ordered by the governor to shelter in place, yet we kept getting fee increases during that whole time.

The owners of that license became very frustrated and attempted to surrender that license. The previous administrator, executive director, would not set it for a Commission review or action. And so when Chairman Pate was appointed to the Commission and subsequently Amy Cook was hired and restored fiscal responsibility to the agency and started repairing the relationships within the industry, my clients became very encouraged and once again have an appetite and attitude to see pari-mutuel racing succeed in Texas.

CHAIRMAN PATE: Any other questions or comments, commissioners?

(No response.) 1 2 CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Thank you very 3 much, Mr. Azopardi, for your comments. Is there anyone else, Virginia, that signed up 4 5 for public comment on this matter? 6 MS. FIELDS: No, sir, no one else signed up for 7 public comment. 8 CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Then, General Cook, 9 will you please address agenda item 2, Gulf Coast Racing? 10 MS. COOK: Thank you, Judge Pate. Gulf Coast Racing is located in Harlingen, 11 Texas -- I apologize, that's Valley Race Park, sorry, I 12 slept since the last Commission meeting. 13 14 (General laughter.) 15 CHAIRMAN PATE: It's in Corpus Christi, Texas. 16 MS. COOK: It says it right here and I typed it 17 in my script the wrong way, so forgive me. CHAIRMAN PATE: I drove by it this morning. 18 19 MS. COOK: Yes, you did. 20 It's an active operating racetrack. review was in 2018. The difference between the two is 21 22 that, interestingly, Gulf Coast Racing is still 23 simulcasting. 24 They are still simulcasting because in 2023 25 they requested live race dates. They had five live race

dates on the calendar, those race dates were not conducted, however, the racetrack restaurant on the property still continues to hold opportunities for folks to come and do pari-mutuel wagering.

How that benefits Texas at this point in time is that they take signals from Lone Star Park and Sam Houston Race Park, which are the exported Thoroughbred signals that can't lose the state. So there is still a revenue stream that comes into the horse industry, as well as they take signals from other states and around the world for Greyhound racing. So there is a modest amount of income that comes from that, as well as some employees that are employed by the restaurant and run that activity and are licensed by the Commission for pari-mutuel wagering.

Again, Mr. Azopardi is here as a resource witness should y'all have any questions.

CHAIRMAN PATE: Mr. Azopardi, do you have anything further to add?

I would just ask you one question if you happen to know. Do you have any idea -- in reference to what Amy just said, do you have any idea what the handle is, related to the betting coming out of Corpus Christi on intrastate racing?

MR. AZOPARDI: I do not know currently, Mr.

Chairman. Sally Briggs is here, she's the operational 1 2 manager for that facility, as well as for Gulf Greyhound, 3 and she may be able to answer that specifically. 4 I will tell you that prior to the pandemic, 5 prior to our shutdown, the two tracks together contributed 6 over a million dollars a year to horse purses from the 7 wagering activity at the two Greyhound tracks. So they are very much an integral part of the overall community of 8 9 racing. 10 CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Thank you. COMMISSIONER McNABB: I do have a question. 11 So currently at Corpus Christi the only active facility is 12 the clubhouse/restaurant and facilities to do 13 14 simulcasting. Correct? 15 MR. AZOPARDI: That is correct. We currently 16 employ about 20 Texans in that facility. 17 COMMISSIONER McNABB: The rest of the backside 18 is just --19 MR. AZOPARDI: It is shuttered, yes, ma'am. 20 COMMISSIONER McNABB: Okay. But everyone who works at that still has to be licensed because there is 21 22 pari-mutuel wagering. Correct? 23 MS. COOK: There are three Greyhound licenses 24 for the mutuels team; everyone else is restaurant staff. 25 COMMISSIONER McNABB: Okay. So that's our

regulatory footprint is simply what goes on for that pari-1 2 mutuel. But my understanding is that facility does bring benefit to Sam Houston Race Park, Lone Star Park, and 3 4 hopefully Retama Park. It's still a player within the 5 landscape of our industry. 6 MS. COOK: Correct. And they take Gillespie 7 County Fair's signal. They take export from other tracks 8 in Texas, but particularly help Lone Star Park and Sam 9 Houston without them doing export beyond the state 10 borders. So they take that signal there. 11 COMMISSIONER McNABB: They don't take Retama? 12 MS. COOK: Retama. I'm sorry, all of them. 13 They take all of them. 14 COMMISSIONER McNABB: Okay. So again, it does 15 plow money back into the larger industry. 16 MS. COOK: It does, yes. And what I'll do is 17 I'll get that handle number, I'll get with Sally and we'll get that to you in your next commissioner update so you'll 18 19 have that information. 20 MR. AZOPARDI: And if I may add, I appreciate 21 the opportunity to work with this committee. I do think 22 we can find a solution to move forward. 23 The only thing I will say is, once again, 24 General Cook showed in her remarks earlier that great

It's not

fiscal responsibility, and we appreciate that.

25

something we're asking for, not to pay our fees, because I 1 2 recognize that the legislature didn't appropriate money 3 for the regulation of Greyhound racing. But we still have 4 licenses and so we fully expect to pay some sort of fees 5 because there is going to be cost of regulation of that 6 license. 7 Just as you pointed out, Commissioner McNabb, there are employees that we have that have to be licensed, 8 9 so we don't fully expect to not pay fees. 10 CHAIRMAN PATE: Well, I guess that all remains to be seen as we go forward here. 11 12 MS. COOK: I'm not going to charge you. 13 (General laughter.) 14 CHAIRMAN PATE: We really do appreciate that 15 Mr. Azopardi, as well as Ms. Brown and others, have contributed a lot of discussion to these issues. And they 16 17 are issues that are going to have to be resolved. And I think you would agree with me, ultimately 18 19 it is a legislative decision, don't you believe, in terms of the ultimate resolution? 20 21 MR. AZOPARDI: Absolutely. There's statutory 22 requirements that can only be changed by the legislature. 23 CHAIRMAN PATE: Right. Thank you very much. 24 No further questions? 25 (No response.)

CHAIRMAN PATE: All right.

MR. AZOPARDI: Thank you.

MS. COOK: So I have said, since I got this job, for example, when we did the training facility licenses that we never had issued before and we needed to go forward and issue the training facility license, use that \$1,800 -- which didn't add to the funds of the agency because we had more cash than appropriations -- to update your equine ambulances and do things that keep the tracks safer.

So I would just say whenever we have an opportunity to waive fees or say that we really don't think it's good government to take fees, use those fees to make things more safe. Thank you.

So with that, I'll turn it back to you, Judge Pate.

CHAIRMAN PATE: All right. Thank you very much.

Commissioners, there will be no executive session this meeting, so the next item on the agenda is item 9, scheduling of the next Commission meeting. The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, October 18, 2023, at 10:30. The meeting will be held here at the Department of Public Safety offices, 6100 Guadalupe, Building E, in the Criminal Law Enforcement Auditorium here in Austin.
